Day 1-2 Chronicles 33-36

Read 2 Chronicles 33-36 in your Bible.

Day 2-2 Chronicles 33

1. What did Manasseh do that was designed to intentionally offend God? (33:1-9)

<u>Digging Deeper:</u> Look up Jeremiah 15:4. From the information in 33:1-9 why do you think Manasseh was named as the one responsible for the coming exile of Judah?

2. What steps did God take to get Manasseh's attention according to 33:10?

3. What was it that made Manasseh realize that "the LORD alone is God"? (33:12-13)

<u>Picture and Ponder:</u> "Forgiveness is limited, not by the amount of sin, but by our willingness to repent." NLT Chronological Life Application Study Bible notes.

Manasseh's epitaph in 33:18-20 reminds readers of his legacy of sin, but it also points to God's mercy and forgiveness in response to Manasseh's humble prayer. Manasseh was considered the worst king Judah had and his actions sealed certain judgment upon Judah, but yet God forgave him when he humbled himself and turned back to God.

Is there someone in your life who you despair of ever turning or returning to God? Remember Manasseh and how far he went into sin and how gracious and merciful God was to get his attention and bring him to repentance.

- Spend time now praying for someone in your life who is lost. Ask for God's
 mercy on them, that they might see their need for a savior and turn to God.

9. What mistake did Josiah make that was similar to many of his ancestors? (35:20-22)

<u>Scholar's Note</u>: "The Lord's consistent message to his people had been that they must rely on him and, correspondingly, keep themselves from involvement in the international power politics of their day." –Expositor's Commentary

10. Trace Josiah's spiritual progression. How is his faith demonstrated when he is 16 and 20 years old (34:3)? When Josiah is 26 years old the Book of the Law is found. How does his faith progress after that?

Scholar's Note: "Josiah instituted the most thorough of all the OT reforms, dating to 622, and one that restored Israel's commitment to God's Book. It was this faith in holy Scripture that was then able to keep the nation's hope alive during their exile through most of the succeeding century (cf. Dan 9: 2), during the difficult century of restoration that followed (Ezra 7: 10; Mal 4: 4), and during the next four hundred, silent years until the appearance of John the Baptist (Mal 3: 1; 4: 5- 6) and the kingdom of Jesus the Messiah, God's personal Word, who fulfilled the written Word (Matt 5: 17- 18)."- Expositor's Commentary

Day 5-2 Chronicles 36

<u>Digging Deeper:</u> Read Isaiah 44:21-28. What had Isaiah prophesied almost 150 years earlier? How does this impact you?
